WALKING BY **HOME GROUP STUDY & DEVOTIONAL**

As you begin, ask the Holy Spirit to teach you and guide your study.

- 1. Read Exodus 17:8-16. By what means did Israel defeat Amalek? Discuss how each is important.
- 2. What was God teaching Israel, and us, by having Moses raise his staff and his hands during the battle.
- 3. In response to the battle with Amalek, Moses built an altar (v. 15). In your own words, explain the meaning of the altar's name and how it applies to your life.
- 4. In what ways does this passage emphasize both the spiritual and the physical? Why is it important to understand how they interact in the Christian life?
- 5. Every day an opposing enemy pushes us away from God. How does knowing this affect the way we view our own life's circumstances? What should our response to this knowledge be?
- 6. God didn't let the people face a battle as soon as they left Egypt, but now they are facing their first one. Why now? What does this tell you about God, and what lesson does this have for our walk today?
- 7. How seriously would you say you regard prayer as a spiritual weapon? How has God used this weapon in your own life? How is He using it now to instruct you?
- 8. Are you sharing specific requests with one or more prayer partners regularly? Are you praying for them in a purposeful way? What is lost when we don't provide prayer support for others, or don't receive it?

FOD FLIDTHED STLIDY

This is the first mention of Joshua in the Bible. His name means "the LORD saves." The Greek form of his name is Iesous [ee-YAY-soos], from which we get "Jesus" in English. Apparently Joshua stood out as a soldier of superior skill, no doubt possessing additional leadership skills that would enable him to prepare an otherwise untrained army for battle. Joshua is an ordinary man, but consider from the passages below how God is already preparing him even now for extraordinary tasks in Israel's history.

Exodus 24:13; 32:17; 33:11

Numbers 11:26-30; 13:8-16; 14:5-9; 27:12-21; 32:28-30: 34:16-17

Deuteronomy 1:37-38; 3:21-29; 31:3-8, 14-23

The moment Moses was no longer able to hold his hands up, the children of Israel began to lose the fight. If it had not been for Moses. Israel would have lost the battle. The important thing to remember is that the Holy Spirit is the only One who can give us victory over the flesh. Victory comes as the believer walks in the Spirit. When you and I act independently of the Spirit, Amalek (or the flesh) wins an easy victory. When Moses' hands were held up, the Israelites won. You and I never will be able to overcome the flesh. It is only the Spirit of God who can do that.

Many people attempt to serve God in their own strength and in doing so strip God of the glory. - "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." (John 3:16 NASB) You can use this prayer to express your decision to God:
- "Dear God, I know that I am a sinner. I believe that Jesus Christ died on the cross for me and rose from the dead. I trust in Him alone as the only way to get right with You. Thank You for the forgiveness of sins and the eternal life I now have. Amen."
