HOME GROUP STUDY & DEVOTIONAL

Before you begin, ask the Holy Spirit to teach you and guide your study.

1. Skim over Exodus 12:33—13:16. Do you think there was any other way God could have accomplished the exodus of His people rather than the drastic measures portrayed here? Why or why not?

2. Why did a “mixed multitude” join Israel in leaving Egypt? What might distinguish a true child of God from one of the “mixed multitude” in our own time?

3. How would you define *worship*?

How do we implement worship into daily life?

4. By redeeming Israel from slavery and sparing its firstborn from judgment, the Lord became each person's new owner. How do the following passages portray the Christian in a similar light, and how does each encourage you in the battle against sin?

1 Corinthians 6:20

5. Why do we sometimes go back to the slavery God freed us from? What should we strive to remember when tempted to do this in a weak moment?

6. Read John 4:23-24. Israel had to prepare themselves to follow God out of Egypt. In a similar way, how can you prepare to worship Him this Sunday, and every week thereafter? How seriously do you take this part of your walk with God?

7. Do you give God the first of everything you have, or do you end up giving Him what you can spare later? Why is this so? What changes are you motivated to make in this area?

8. What aspects of your life can you take special care to consecrate to the Lord this week?

It's a mark of maturity when we learn that freedom is a tool to build with, not a toy to play with, and that freedom involves accepting responsibility. Israel's exodus experience taught them that their future success lay in fulfilling three important responsibilities: following the Lord, trusting the Lord, and praising the Lord.

The purpose of the Passover was to remind God's people of his gracious act of deliverance. When the children saw the feast, they were to ask, “What does this ceremony mean?” The parents could then tell them of God's grace and love. The text has a certain symmetry between Egypt's treatment of Israel in the early chapters of Exodus and God's treatment of Egypt here. As Egypt had killed all the Israelite sons and had oppressed God's firstborn, Israel, so now their firstborn were taken, and they were avenged for the mistreatment they had done.

No soul can really feast upon Christ while he is in doubt about his own salvation. “Fear has torment” (1 John 4:18) and this is the opposite of joy and salvation, of which “feasting” speaks. Little wonder then that there are so many joyless professing Christians. How could it be otherwise? “Rejoice” said Christ to the disciples, “that your names are written in Heaven” (Luke 10:20). Until this joy of assurance is ours there cannot be, we say again, any feasting upon Christ.

Being a Christian isn't based on membership in a local church or keeping a set of rules. 3. Understand that Jesus Christ took the penalty for your sin by dying in your place and that He rose again. (Romans 5:8; 2 Corinthians 5:21)
4. Receive the free gift of salvation by trusting in Christ alone as your Savior. (Romans 4:4-5; Ephesians 2:8-9)

“For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life.” (John 3:16 NASB) You can use this prayer to express your decision to God:

“Dear God, I know that I am a sinner. I believe that Jesus Christ died on the cross for me and rose from the dead. I trust in Him alone as the only way to get right with You. Thank You for the forgiveness of sins and the eternal life I now have. Amen.”
