HOME GROUP STUDY & DEVOTIONAL

Before you begin, ask the Holy Spirit to teach you and guide your study.

- 1. Read Exodus 13:17-22. What factors did God take into account when selecting Israel's route to Canaan? What does this tell you about Him?
- 2. God chose the long route for Israel instead of the short route. When in your life has God taken you the long way, and how can your knowledge from that experience encourage others?
- 3. God didn't show His people their entire route, just the next step. Why do you think God tends to guide us in this way? What would we lose if we knew the whole journey ahead of time?
- 4. What was the sign of God's presence with His people, and what did it do for them?
- 5. God visibly guided the Israelites on their way. How does God guide believers today? How has He guided you personally?
- 6. How would your life change if you focused more on contentment with God in the present moment rather than focusing on a destination you have in mind? What are some ways you can shift your focus more to the Lord?
- 7. It can be helpful to focus on what you do know instead of what you don't know. Write down Scriptures or characteristics of God you know from times He guided you in the past. How does reviewing past lessons help you face what you don't know about the future?
- 8. What points from the sermon were especially helpful or encouraging to you, and why?

FOR FURTHER STUDY

Read 2 Corinthians 1:8-10, 4:7-11 and 12:7-10 to see different ways God uses to teach us to depend more fully on Him. How do they speak to your life now? What other Scriptures teach similar lessons?

Nothing takes God by surprise, for in His providence He plans the best way for His people to take. We may not always understand the way He chooses, or even agree with it, but His way is always the right way. We may confidently say, "He leads me in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake" (Ps 23:3 NKJV), and we should humbly pray, "Show me Your ways, O LORD; teach me Your paths. Lead me in Your truth and teach me" (25:4-5 NKJV). ... If you permit the Lord to direct your steps (Prov 3:5-6), expect to be led occasionally on paths that may seem unnecessarily long and circuitous. Remind yourself that God knows what He's doing, He isn't in a hurry, and as long as you follow Him, you're safe and in the place of His blessing. He may close some doors and suddenly open others, and we must be alert (Acts 16:6-10; 2 Cor 2:12-13).

This people who had spent many long years in slavery were now starting out for the promised land, and it is beautiful to see this tender concern for them. It exemplifies a principle of general application in connection with the Lord's dealings with His people. The Lord is not only very compassionate, but His mercies are "tender" (Jas 5:11). The Lord does not suffer His "babes" to be tested as severely as those who are more mature: witness the various trials to which He subjected Abraham—the command for him to offer Isaac was not the first but the last great test which he received. It was so here with Israel. Later, there would be much fighting when Canaan was reached, but at the beginning He led them not the way of the land of the Philistines, for that would have involved warfare. - 3. Understand that Jesus Christ took the penalty for your sin by dying in your place and that He rose again. (Romans 5:8; 2 Corinthians 5:21)
- 4. Receive the free gift of salvation by trusting in Christ alone as your Savior. (Romans 4:4-5; Ephesians 2:8-9)
- "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." (John 3:16 NASB) You can use this prayer to express your decision to God:
- "Dear God, I know that I am a sinner. I believe that Jesus Christ died on the cross for me and rose from the dead. I trust in Him alone as the only way to get right with You. Thank You for the forgiveness of sins and the eternal life I now have. Amen."
