


1 JOHN 4:7-12

HOME GROUP LESSON F A DISCIPLE & DEVOTIONAL

Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal His truth and wisdom as you go through this lesson.

1. Read 1 John 4: 7, 12. How is Christian fellowship different from relationships with unbelievers? (See also Jn 13:34-35, 17:23, 18:36; 1 Jn 1:3.)

2. How have your expectations of what Christian community should look like influenced how you relate to other believers?

3. What would you say to someone who avoids Christian fellowship or worship due to hurts they've experienced before?

4. How do our pride and preferences cause disunity in Christ's body, especially today? How can you contribute humbly toward harmony on the midst of differences? What can you give up for others in this regard (Phil 2:3; 1 Cor 8:9)?

5. Why must we grasp that loving God can't be practiced apart from loving for His children? Why does this matter, especially in relation to outsiders?

6. How can you be more intentional in showing love to other believers? Write down the name of a person you have been neglecting to treat as a sibling in Christ. How can you focus more on them this week?

A WONDERFUL OFFER

Being a Christian isn't based on membership in a local church or keeping a set of rules. It involves a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and an understanding of who He is and what He has done to provide man with a way to experience God's love for us. Here's how to know Jesus Christ as your personal Savior:

1. Realize that you are sinful and separated from God. (Romans 3:23; Isaiah 53:6)

2. Recognize that the penalty for your sin is death-eternal separation from God and all that is good. (Romans 6:23: Hebrews 9:27)

3. Understand that Jesus Christ took the penalty for your sin by dying in your place and that He rose again. (Romans 5:8; 2 Corinthians 5:21)

4. Receive the free gift of salvation by trusting in Christ alone as your Savior. (Romans 4:4-5; Ephesians 2:8-9)

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." (John 3:16 NASB) You can use this prayer to express your decision to God:

"Dear God, I know that I am a sinner. I believe that Jesus Christ died on the cross for me and rose from the dead. I trust in Him alone as the only way to get right with You. Thank You for the forgiveness of sins and the eternal life I now have. Amen."

"Fellowship with the body of Christ is God's great classroom of the development of Christian character. We are benefitted by both the strengths and weaknesses of the fellowship. The mature ones help to strengthen and encourage us, while the weaknesses in the less mature give us the opportunity to practice our spiritual growth. Get involved and stay in faithful fellowship with the body of Christ! Don't run off if something disappoints you or you get your feelings hurt—this only demonstrates immaturity and places you in further danger of losing out with God." D. A. ROBBINS

"To say it quite simply: God suffers because of us, for He wants to suffer us. This is more than a word play. Indeed, everything may be at stake in this saying: He wants to suffer us, and we are indeed suffered by Him. Can we suffer those who are different from us? May the others suffer us? Can we suffer ourselves? Whom can we 'not endure'? We are always causing suffering for each other: siblings, husbands and wives, parents and children, neighbors and colleagues. These spheres of suffering are deeply implicated in the church and politics. If we ourselves are not able to suffer, then nothing can possibly please us. But if we are able to suffer, then we take nothing amiss. The love of God which is infinitely capable of suffering reaches us in Christ.' JÜRGEN MOLTMANN

"Conducting our lives on a daily basis in close proximity to others guarantees that there will be tensions, misunderstandings, individual subjectivities, struggles and differences of opinion. Our disrespect for one another, our rebellion toward authority, our innate selfishness and insidious self-justifications are revealed. It is a painful but necessary revelation of our hearts. We have to pass through a valley of disillusionment with what we think true fellowship is, what we as God's people are, and not the least, what we ourselves are capable of. In fact, the most painful revelation we need to face is the truth of our own condition. True fellowship is the courage and the willingness to be with one another and bear with one another in all of the above conditions." ARTHUR KATZ
