THE TIMES ...


Cyrus issued a decree allowing the Jews to return and rebuild the Temple (538 BC)

Zerubbabel led the first 50,000 exiles home

They laid the Temple's foundation in 535 BC

But oppression, laziness and apathy have brought the work to a halt for 15 years

So God sends Haggai in 520 BC to exhort and encourage His people to get back to work



THE BASICS ...

Who: Haggai ("feast") When: postexilic (Aug to Dec 520 BC) Where: to the first wave of returned exiles

Why: "Haggai's primary purpose in writing was to encourage the people who returned to Israel to continue the task of rebuilding the temple after a sixteen-year hiatus." -Charles Dyer

LESSON THEME: It's not how you start, but how you finish

#1: Self-Centered Priorities

1:1-15; August 29, 520 BC

The exiles were plenty industrious when it came to building their own fine houses

But had grown apathetic and lazy toward building God's Temple

They were making excuses for their self-centered priorities, missing some blessings

But the Word brought conviction and change

#2: Making Comparisons

2:1-9; October 17, 520 BC (6 weeks later)

Perhaps the last day of the Feast of Tabernacles; a day of joy and celebration

But instead they were discouraged and complaining; "our work doesn't matter much"

They don't know God's future plans

That Temple stood for almost 500 years and was the site of Jesus' ministry

#3: Unconfessed Sin

2:10-19; December 18, 520 BC (2 months)

Sin and its defilement is "transmittable"

Though they'd been back at work for 4 months, they still weren't being blessed ...

They hadn't confessed their sins (2:14)

Even sacrificial work, if offered by hands with an impure heart, is unacceptable to God

But with confession comes promised blessing

#4: Discouragement

2:20-23; December 18, 520 BC (same day)

The work was undoubtedly hard and Zerubbabel was responsible for encouraging his people

Leaders are especially hard-hit in such times

The weight of responsibility and the circumstances around him got him down

But the Lord knew it and encouraged him with how special he was to Him

Four Derailment Factors

- 1. Self-centered priorities and agendas
- 2. Making comparisons of work done for the Lord
- 3. Unconfessed sin in the lives of those who're trying to advance God's work
- 4. Letting discouragement win out

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APPLICATION: It's not how you start, but how you finish

#1: Self-Centered Priorities

How are your priorities and agendas?

Are you too preoccupied with building your own "house" that you're neglecting His "house?"

Is Jesus the first thought of every day?

Is He the first One consulted in every decision?

Does He get the first dollar of every paycheck?

The first hour of every day?

The first day of every week?

We lose out when we put God second

#2: Making Comparisons

Are you serving the Lord right now?

If you are ...

Do you compare your work with a brother or sister's work for the Lord ... and get discouraged?

Perhaps your work doesn't seem as "large" or as "grandiose" or as "important" as someone else's

Do you know God's future plans for your work?

Repent (John 21:20-22; Phil 4:11-13)

#3: Unconfessed Sin

Unconfessed sin defiles even sacrificial offerings or sacrificial work done in His name

Do you have any known and ongoing but unconfessed sin in your life?

Confess and depend (1 John 1:9; Phil 1:6)

God will not be mocked: unconfessed sin defiles the worshiping heart and the serving hands and won't advance His work

#4: Discouragement

Are you discouraged tonight?

Does the enemy appear to be too strong and has you surrounded?

Lift up your eyes!	
You are precious to Him (Heb 12:22-24)	
His presence is with you (Heb 13:5)	
Don't allow circumstances to cause you to walk by si	ght instead of faith (2 Cor 5:7)




Building God's temple should be the people's priority rather than building their own homes

> There are consequences for disobeying God

God provides the inspiration, strength and resources for those who obey him

God will bless the exiles with his presence, peace and prosperity if they obey him



Frieze of Prophets, East Wall (Boston Public Library)

A contract dated January 18, 1893 officially commissioned painter John Singer Sargent to undertake work on the Boston Public Library Murals. Represented in this west segment of the wall from left to right are Micah, Haggai, Malachi and Zechariah. Canvases were completed in Sargent's studios in Morgan Hall, England and London, England, and shipped to Boston and adhered to the library walls in four installations occurring in 1895, 1903, 1916 and 1919. Total measurement of "Frieze of Prophets" measures approximately 39x7 feet.

John Singer Sargent (1856-1925) was born in Florence, Italy to an American family. He was educated in Paris and spent most of his life living and working in England. The artist maintained close ties to Boston and painted the Boston Public Library murals. The murals—arguably his most ambitious works—represented an opportunity to solidify his reputation as a master.

Sargent artist used "raised relief" elements, including wood, metal, papier-mâché, glass, and plaster to help emboss and illuminate the figures in natural light. He traveled to the Middle East to study the vernacular of the region and to compose studies for the figures in this portion.

HAGGAI

served as a prophet to Judah about 520 B.C., after the return from exile

Climate of the times

. The people of Judah had been exiled to Babylon in 586 B.C., and Jerusalem and the Temple had been destroyed. Under Cyrus, king of Persia, the Jews were allowed to return to Judah and rebuild their Temple.

Main message

The people returned to Jerusalem to begin rebuilding the Temple, but they hadn't finished. Haggai's message encouraged the people to finish rebuilding God's Temple.

Importance of message . . . The Temple lay half-finished while the people lived in beautiful homes. Haggai warned them against putting their possessions and jobs ahead of God. We must put God first in our lives.
