I. Paul is _____ in making disciples.

I myself am satisfied about you, my brothers, that you yourselves are full of goodness, filled with all knowledge and able to instruct one another. But on some points I have written to you very boldly by way of reminder, because of the grace given me by God to be a minister of Christ Jesus to the Gentiles in the priestly service of the gospel of God, so that the offering of the Gentiles may be acceptable, sanctified by the Holy Spirit. vv. 14-16

The passion behind godly striving comes from recognizing who is calling you to action.

II. Paul is _____ of his work.

In Christ Jesus, then, I have reason to be proud of my work for God. For I will not venture to speak of anything except what Christ has accomplished through me to bring the Gentiles to obedience—by word and deed, by the power of signs and wonders, by the power of the Spirit of God ... v. 17-19a

The focus for godly boasting is all about what God has accomplished through you.

III. Paul is _____ to reach the lost.

... so that from Jerusalem and all the way around to Illyricum I have fulfilled the ministry of the gospel of Christ; and thus I make it my ambition to preach the gospel, not where Christ has already been named, lest I build on someone else's foundation, but as it is written, "Those who have never been told of him will see, and those who have never heard will understand." vv. 19b-21

The scale of godly ambition is driven by the scope of the mission God has given you.

1. Read Romans 15:14-33. What are some of the features of Paul's work so far (vv. 17-21)? What kinds of power were evident in what he had been doing?

2. What attitudes toward himself and his mission does Paul express in this passage?

3. What do you see in Paul's ministry (attitudes as well as accomplishments) that you would like to imitate in your own work for God?

"Paul saw himself, in the scheme of things, as an instrument in the hands of Christ. He talked not of what he had done. but of what Christ had done with him. He never said of anything: 'I did it.' He always said: 'Christ used me to do it.' ... It is when we stop thinking of what we can do and begin to think of what God can do with us that things begin to happen."

"'To whom he was not spoken of, they shall see: and they that have not heard shall understand' seems to be Paul's life verse as a missionary. It is a quotation of Isaiah 52:15. Paul was thrilled to go and preach the gospel to those who were spiritually blind. After Paul had preached, some brother would say, 'I understand, brother Paul. I will accept Christ as my Savior.' My friend, there is no thrill equal to presenting Christ and having people turn to Him." J. VERNON MCGEE

5. One theologian has said Being proud of God's *work is not a sin—it is worship.* What does that statement mean to you? Do you feel the same?

6. As you read verses 22-29, what about Paul's plans for travel jump out at you, knowing the plans the Lord ultimately had for him instead? How does that encourage your own walk?

7. In verse 24 Paul assumes that in Rome he will be "helped on my journey" (probably meaning housing, supplies and perhaps even companionship for the next leg of the trip). In what ways can you also help the work of Christ?

8. Why does Paul ask for prayer in verses 30-33? With whom can you strive in prayer for their ministry of the gospel?

A WONDERFUL OFFER-

Being a Christian isn't based on membership in a local church or keeping a set of rules. It involves a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and an understanding of who He is and what He has done to provide man with a way to experience God's love for us. Here's how to know Jesus Christ as your personal Savior:

1. Realize that you are sinful and separated from God. (Romans 3:23; Isaiah 53:6)

2. Recognize that the penalty for your sin is death-eternal separation from God and all that is good. (Romans 6:23; Hebrews 9:27)

3. Understand that Jesus Christ took the penalty for your sin by dying in your place and that He rose again. (Romans 5:8; 2 Corinthians 5:21)

4. Receive the free gift of salvation by trusting in Christ alone as your Savior. (Romans 4:4-5; Ephesians 2:8-9) "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." (John 3:16 NASB) You can use this prayer to express your decision to God:

"Dear God, I know that I am a sinner. I believe that Jesus Christ died on the cross for me and rose from the dead. I trust in Him alone as the only way to get right with You. Thank You for the forgiveness of sins and the eternal life I now have. Amen."
