# LESSON I: We cannot live faithfully for God trusting in our own

One day, when Moses had grown up, he went out to his people and looked on their burdens, and he saw an Egyptian beating a Hebrew, one of his people. He looked this way and that, and seeing no one, he struck down the Egyptian and hid him in the sand. vv. 11-12

# LESSON 2: We cannot live faithfully for God depending on our own

When he went out the next day, behold, two Hebrews were struggling together. And he said to the man in the wrong, "Why do you strike your companion?" He answered, "Who made you a prince and a judge over us? Do you mean to kill me as you killed the Egyptian?" Then Moses was afraid, and thought, "Surely the thing is known." vv. 13-14

# **DEVOTIONAL & HOME GROUP STUDY**

#### Before you begin, ask the Holy Spirit to teach you and guide your study.

1. Read Exodus 2:11-15. What do you learn about Moses' character at this stage of his life so far?



3. What similarities and differences do you find between Exodus 2 and Matthew 2? Why did Jesus relive Israel's history leading toward the Exodus?

4. Why would discipline and suffering be a necessary part of God's plan for Moses, and for us?

5. List the behaviors and attitudes present in a strong-willed child. What is it that makes us so prone to demand our own way?

6. How do you see willfulness in the heart and actions of Moses? What were some of the consequences of his willful behavior?

7. What are some of the common signs of willfulness you've seen in your life? What negative consequences have you faced because of a willful decision you made, and what has God done to redeem the situation?

8. What is one area of your life where you need the prayers and support of your Home Group as you seek to submit to God's will rather than follow your own wilfullness?



"Moses' desire to help his brethren was admirable, but his method was deplorable (v. 12; cf. Acts 7:23-29). He trusted in his own ability to liberate the Israelites, and he sought to bring this about by natural means. He even resorted to sinful means, and seized authority, rather than waiting for God to give it to him. Moses' faith is obvious in his desire to identify with God and His people (cf. Ruth). He probably struggled in his younger years with whether he could do more for the Israelites by working for them within the Egyptian hierarchy or from without. He chose to identify with the faithful, and relied on the power of Godeventually taking the role of a humble shepherd holding a staff, rather than on the power of an Egyptian prince holding a scepter."

"The man who was 'mighty in word and deed' is now in the lonely pastures taking care of stubborn sheep, but that was just the kind of preparation he needed for leading a nation of stubborn people. Israel was God's special flock (Ps 100:3) and Moses His chosen shepherd. Like Joseph's thirteen years as a slave in Egypt and Paul's three years' hiatus after his conversion (Gal 1:16-17), Moses' forty years of waiting and working prepared him for a lifetime of faithful ministry. God doesn't lay hands suddenly on His servants but takes time to equip them for their work." WARREN WIERSBE

"Dear God, I know that I am a sinner. I believe that Jesus Christ died on the cross for me and rose from the dead. I trust in Him alone as the only way to get right with You. Thank You for the forgiveness of sins and the eternal life I now have. Amen."
