DEVOTIONAL & HOME GROUP STUDY

Before you begin, ask the Holy Spirit to teach you and guide your study.

- 1. Read Exodus 2:23-25. How did God feel about His people's sufferings?
- 2. Why do you think God allowed His people to suffer under the Egyptians?
- 3. Read Hebrews 11:23-27. This chapter mentions the heroes of the faith who came before us. How do you feel knowing that God raised up a leader who was also a murderer?
- 4. What does the fact that God used a person with a past like Moses' tell you about Him?
- 5. Read Genesis 15. What insight does this passage give you into what God "remembered"?
- 6. Long before the people of Israel cried out to God in their distress, God was already at work preparing Moses so he would be ready to deliver them when the timing was right. How does this fact relate to vour own life?
- 7. Has there been a time in your life when it seemed like God was "hard of hearing"? What did He teach you during that time, and how did you carry that lesson forward in your life?
- 8. How did the sermon help you in your walk of faith? Where will you be applying that insight?
- 9. Take some time to thank the Lord for how He used the sermon to encourage you. Pray for our pastors who faithfully bring the Word of God to His people each week. Ask for God's deliverance from the enemy's opposition the church faces each year as we plan for Easter.



"While the nation suffered the Lord was preparing for their deliverance. They were completely unaware that, in an unknown place in an unimaginable way, the Lord was calling an unexpected man to be their deliverer. God's providence in the preparation of Moses may have served as an encouragement for Moses' readers. During the oppression in Egypt, the Jewish people could not have anticipated how God would work to prepare a leader for them, but He was working. In the same way, He would undertake for them in equally surprising ways to conquer the land when they would enter it."

"God saved us for the same reason He saved Israel. He found nothing in us that called for His salvation. He makes it quite clear that we are not saved because of any merit we possess. Paul explains it in Romans 3:23-24, 'For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God; being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus.' The word freely means 'without a cause.' We have been saved from our sins without a cause. It is the same word our Lord used when He said that He was hated without a cause (Jn 15:25). God did not look at me and say, 'My, you are white and Protestant, honest and hardworking, and I'm going to redeem you.' The fact of the matter is that God saw us in the blackness and darkness of sin and ignorance. He saw that we were hopelessly lost and not able to save ourselves. God's love provided a Savior. God so loved us that He gave His only begotten Son, John 3:16 tells us. However, it was not His love that saved us; it was His grace. We are saved without a cause by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus."
