WALKING BY **HOME GROUP STUDY & DEVOTIONAL**

As you begin, ask the Holy Spirit to teach you and guide your study.

- 1. Read Exodus 20:22—23:19. Christians are no longer "under law" (Rom 6:15), but we are "slaves to God" (Rom 6:22). How, then, are passages like this relevant to our lives today?
- 2. How does God's law stress the value of human life?
- 3. What does this passage say about God's character?
- 4. In other Near Eastern cultures, a slave was the total, permanent property of their master. What humanitarian limits did God place on slavery in Israel (21:1-11, 20-21, 26-27)?
- 5. What seem to be the purposes of Israel's three annual festivals (23:14-17)?
- 6. How is the principle of restitution (22:1-4) applied in Luke 19:8-10?
- 7. Ianorance and nealect were as punishable as deliberate infractions when they affected others (22:5-6, 14). Have you damaged anyone's possessions or feelings because of carelessness? If so, what can you do about this?
- 8. Read Matthew 5:38-42. Why do you think Jesus told us to treat people with generosity rather than justice? Do you think He was rejecting the principle of fair retribution in the legal system as well as in private relationships? Why or why not?

A WONDERFUL OFFER-

Being a Christian isn't based on membership in a local church or keeping a set of rules. It involves a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and an understanding of who He is and what He has done to provide man with a way to experience God's love for us. Here's how to know Jesus Christ as your personal Savior:

- 1. Realize that you are sinful and separated from God. (Romans 3:23; Isaiah 53:6)
- 2. Recognize that the penalty for your sin is death—eternal separation from God and all that is good. (Romans 6:23; Hebrews 9:27)
- 3. Understand that Jesus Christ took the penalty for your sin by dying in your place and that He rose again. (Romans 5:8; 2 Corinthians 5:21)
- 4. Receive the free gift of salvation by trusting in Christ alone as your Savior. (Romans 4:4-5; Ephesians 2:8-9)
- "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." (John 3:16 NASB) You can use this prayer to express your decision to God:
- "Dear God, I know that I am a sinner. I believe that Jesus Christ died on the cross for me and rose from the dead. I trust in Him alone as the only way to get right with You. Thank You for the forgiveness of sins and the eternal life I now have. Amen."

This section of Exodus includes basic laws that deal especially with the protection of human life and property. By accepting "the book of the covenant" (Ex 24:3-8), the people entered into a special relationship with Jehovah and obligated themselves to obey Him. These laws were not arbitrary; they're based on the character of God and the unchanging moral principles expressed in the Ten Commandments. Law is powerless to change human nature; it can only protect life and property by regulating human behavior. One of the most dangerous and disastrous periods in Jewish history was the time of the judges when "every man did that which was right in his own eyes" (Judg 17:6; see also 18:1; 19:1; 21:25). The enforcing of good laws doesn't guarantee a perfect society, but it does promote order and prevent anarchy.

The laws in 21:1-23:12 are to be understood merely as a representative selection of the whole Mosaic Law. It is not an attempt at a complete listing of all the laws. The purpose of the selection was to provide a basis for teaching the nature of divine justice. By studying specific cases of the application of God's will in concrete situations, the reader of the Pentateuch could learn the basic principles undergirding the covenant relationship. Whereas the 'ten words' provided a general statement of the basic principles of justice which God demanded of His people, the examples selected here further demonstrated how those principles, or ideals, were to be applied to real life situations. The continual return to the theme of idolatry throughout this section of the book is preparation and background for an appreciation of the incident of the golden calf (Ex 32). JOHN SAILHAMER
